This workshop examines the transnational connections underpinning anticolonialist movements and the counter-insurgency operations designed to stop them. How did insurrectional and counter-insurrectional movement intersect and how did they gain support at the regional and international levels? What were the ideas, experiences, models, and personnel exchanged among them? How did international organizations and world opinion become involved in these wars of decolonization? These questions and others are at the heart of this gathering of international specialists.
